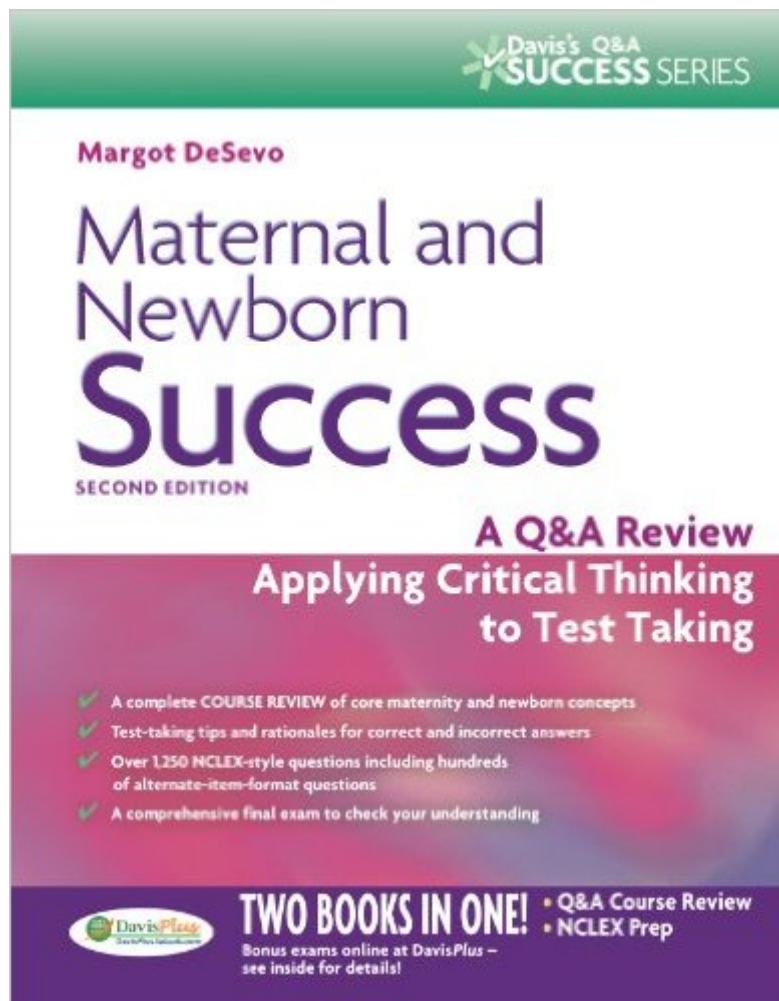

This book was my lifeline. The way the questions are worded prepared me for how the tests were going to be and by studying the rationales as well, I was able to critically think through the questions I wasn't sure of. No lie, I wouldn't have made it through without this book and the peds one as well. I am currently in my mental health quarter and have the Davis book for that as well. Once again, I am passing thanks to the Q&A format of these books. When I graduate, I'll find this Davis person and Kiss him on the lips!! One key advice, don't just ask and answer, really study the rationales because they are the key to the tests. Good luck!!

Some of the questions in this book were almost identical to the questions on my OB exams in nursing school. It was very helpful to practice the questions in this book the night before exams to make sure I knew the material. I have found all of the "Success" books helpful so far in nursing school.

The book itself probably has great content but using a text book in electronic form is difficult so I don't refer to it very often. I have to go through a menu bar or search bar to get anywhere instead of skipping through pages like you can do with a paper text. It is also difficult to see the entire page all at once - I feel like I am looking at mount Rushmore through a box viewer; just can't get the whole picture that way - can't visually scan for titles, charts etc. I think I will buy the hold-in-your-hand book again next time.

My professor was taking many questions from the different sections of this book and rewording them. The content of this book is broken down well. I found that reading this book and really paying attention to the incorrect answers, as well as the correct ones, gave me a huge edge in my OB nursing class. On my last exam of 35 questions, I recognized about 18 from this book. I didn't have to read and study the whole thing either. Just the parts that coincided with what we were being tested on. Recommend you spend more time with this and ignore your teachers suggestions to do

all the case studies and all the Elsevier review questions, etc. Pretty much a waste of time based on the grades from the other students. Review class notes (power points) and do these questions. Some of my classmates who really seemed to know and love everything about OB did much worse on the exams than me, because they followed teacher suggestions on what to study which turned out to be a waste of time (in terms of testing, not knowledge). Additionally, the explanations provided in the book were well laid out. If I had just studied from this book the entire time I would have done even better.

I am currently using this for my maternity rotation. If you need practice questions for exams, this is the book for you! My plan is to use the hard copy for the semester and the online questions for the final. I have an A so far because of this book!

This book helped my test grades come from C's and D's to high B's. My instructor, unfortunately, does not instruct very well, and leaves a lot of information out that would be on the tests. Our books are very vague, also. So, using this book, I was able to bring my OB test scores up. Thank you!

So far, I have four success series books, and they've been very helpful throughout my course. Great books to have for sure!

These books are a godsend. The questions are usually straightforward and simple to understand, and are structured in an NCLEX style without being so obvious that the questions boil down to a 50-50 all the time. I usually take the test on the section we are studying in class to get an idea of what types of information I should be listening for in class, then read the textbook and take notes on the lecture. It is a quick way to sift through the monumental piles of information required for maternity nursing to get at the heart of what is important (what is going to be tested) and focus my energy on learning those sections well, leaving you free to pick up other useful tidbits from class and textbook.

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
